

When Dotty was rescued by the RSPCA from a site in Essex in February 2018, her hooves were so overgrown they were causing her extreme pain and difficulty walking.

She was immediately taken to veterinary practice House & Jackson for treatment and then transferred to our nearby Ada Cole Visitor Centre, near Harlow, to continue her recovery.

Following the successful prosecution of her former owner in September 2018, Dotty has now been pledged a safe, forever home at Redwings where she'll never have to fear pain or neglect again.

She's already settled well into life at the Sanctuary, making new friends within the rest of the donkey herd and charming plenty of visitors!

Abandoned

An abandoned pony, whose incredibly painful foot condition meant she could barely walk, has been given a new forever home

Nelly, a Shetland cross who is believed to be about 16-years-old, was terrified to even be touched when she arrived at our Ada Cole centre in Essex, in September 2018. While she continues to recover physically, she has already come on leaps and bounds in her confidence.

Nelly was rescued in August 2018 by the RSPCA from an area of grassland near the Dartford Tunnel following a call from a concerned member of the public. Poor Nelly, who also has only one eye, was in obvious discomfort from laminitis a very painful hoof condition - and was struggling to place one foot in front of the other. Believed to have been abandoned for some time, she was taken to the local vets where she received treatment, including a much-needed foot trim and pain relief. After no owner came forward, Redwings offered Nelly a new home where she will be able to receive the specialist care she will need for the rest of her life

Shire foal Papillon goes from strength to strength

Do you remember the two Shire foals, Empress and Papillon, born at Redwings who we introduced in the last edition of the newsletter? We're very sorry to tell you that little Empress sadly passed away shortly after publication.

Empress began to suffer complications as a result of a blood infection. and despite the best efforts of our veterinary team, it was decided that the kindest thing to do was to put her to sleep to ensure she did not suffer.





While we were devastated to lose Empress, we're very thankful that Papillon has continued to grow in strength, confidence and mischief... and is already giving many of the ponies at



the Sanctuary a run for their money height-wise at least! Hopefully you'll be able to meet this lovely lady and her friends at a visitor centre soon.



Happy to help!

Redwings constantly looks for ways to support horses beyond the Sanctuary, and sharing our veterinary expertise is just one way of achieving this.

In October, we were contacted by a veterinary practice in Essex for advice on treating a horse called Roo, who had just been diagnosed as a strangles carrier (infected with a nasty respiratory disease - see pages 6 and 7). Most carriers have one or two balls of infected, dried pus (yuk!) called chondroids stuck in their

respiratory system that can be removed under sedation. But Roo had more than 150 chondroids, making her unusual case much more challenging!

Redwings successfully treated a strangles carrier called Benny in 2011 who had over 200 chondroids, so our vet Roxane was happy to travel to Essex to share her experience. Like Benny, Roo needed surgery to allow all the chondroids to be removed in one go, a tricky procedure but one that, thankfully, was a complete success. Today Roo is completely strangles-free and back at home with grateful owner Kezia!

Equine Welfare and the Law


To help more people understand the breadth of our welfare work, we have produced a new booklet called Equine Welfare and the Law.

The booklet explains how our Field Officers and welfare team use the law to improve the lives of horses in all kinds of situations and in many different ways. It outlines the essential elements of the core legislation in England and Wales the Animal Welfare Act - that shapes our welfare work, as well as lifting the lid on some of the challenges that

Redwings and other charities face when approaching situations where a horse's welfare is a concern. Staying a step ahead

Campaigning is all about encouraging people to take action. And this year, following evidence from our 2016 Strangles survey, and boosted by the recognition of our strangles campaign at the 2017 Animal Health Trust awards, we have been developing the campaign to hopefully do just that!

#StampOutStrangles

trangles is the most common infectious disease in horses, and it is extremely contagious. It affects a horse's upper respiratory tract and can cause large abscesses to form, making swallowing difficult and restricting their breathing, hence the name 'strangles'. Although most horses will make a full recovery, the disease can be incredibly distressing and up to 20% of sufferers are also at risk of serious or life-threatening complications.

Although Redwings has been at the forefront of strangles treatment and management for many years, many horse owners whose horses may be at risk of infectious diseases are not aware of the advice and guidance we have available. And, understandably, we know that in the event of a possible disease outbreak they are much more likely to go to their vet for advice than come to Redwings.

So, we have been working with vets to raise awareness of our strangles guidance. They are often under significant pressure to help owners with disease prevention, to help owners manage an outbreak or prevent the disease from spreading.

Taking advantage of newly published veterinary information about the disease, we updated and revised our Strangles Information Pack with the help of an expert panel from across the horse industry and gained the support and promotion of the British Equine Veterinary Association who have endorsed it. Since then we have delivered more than 100 packs to vets across the country and our own expert vets have been providing talks and training to equine vets of the future at the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons and beyond.





But why wait for an outbreak?

Our survey in 2016 told us that yards and individual horse owners are improving their practices due to sad experiences of having to care for a horse with strangles.

This is something that can be horrible for the individual horse and can be painfully disruptive for owners and businesses.

In the knowledge that to drive down disease we need both horse owners and livery yard managers to work together, we have devised a Stamp out Strangles pledge - and films and guidance to help people fulfil it!


By showing how widespread good practices are and rallying the support of horse owners, the pledge aims to motivate people to stick to their good intentions and help us stamp out the disease.

A new chapter!

After rather a long wait it is with very happy hearts that we tell you we have purchased a new centre near Chepstow on the Welsh borders. After many years of frontline welfare work in Wales we have always wanted to have a permanent base in the area, and the second we saw Sheepcot Farm near Offa's Dyke, we knew we had finally found it!

The centre

e have purchased 86 acres of land that actually combines two farms, much like we did with Redwings Aylsham. It includes a converted barn that we hope to use for our visitor centre, plus agricultural buildings and staff accommodation. We have put in planning applications for additional facilities, mainly for the horses, including a special care facility, woodchip areas and a rehoming yard.

Sixty-three horses have already moved in and they have settled in brilliantly to their new digs! These horses were previously living at two sites under the care of the Welsh charity SWHP (Society for the Welfare of Horses and Ponies) but have moved to our centre as they could no longer stay in their existing homes. They are being cared for by SWHP staff who have also made the move and seem to be settling in well too!

A potential merger with Welsh charity SWHP had been on the cards since 2012 and it was finally concluded on 1st February 2019. The merger means we are now legally responsible for SWHP horses and staff and that the new centre in Chepstow will be called Redwings SWHP.

The late Jenny MacGregor MBE was the chairman of SWHP and the charity has been based at her home in St Maughans in Monmouthshire for many years. This amazing lady very sadly passed away in November 2017 at the age of 85. Jenny and her late husband Alasdair were involved in the charity from the start and were a driving force in the animal welfare sector, rescuing over 2,000 horses and ponies in their time. Jenny initiated a merger between SWHP and Redwings back in 2012 and we are very pleased to say that she had the chance to approve the new site at Chepstow and hear our plans for it before she passed away.

The setting

Offa's Dyke is a large linear earthwork dyke that roughly follows the border between England and Wales. The three-mile stretch of the Dyke near our new centre is managed by English Heritage. It is a designated Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and includes the Devil's Pulpit, a limestone outcrop right near our new centre which overlooks the stunning ruins of Tintern Abbey. Legend has it that the devil would use the spot to try and cajole the monks from the Abbey into joining him! Wildlife in the area includes herons, kingfishers and otters in the beautiful River Wye, as well as peregrine falcons and red kites.

The next steps

Our quest for a base in Monmouthshire has now ended, with a new farm that will be called Redwings SWHP (like Redwings Ada Cole and Redwings Mountains). As we have said, there are many developments going on, all subject to consents of course. For the meantime, while the farm is under development and the team (existing SWHP staff and newcomers) gets settled in, it will not be a visitor centre nor open to visitors but will operate like one of our closed sanctuary farms. However, we will update SWHP supporters between newsletters (and anyone else who particularly wants to know how the farm is doing!) and we look forward to seeing supporters there once we are able to do so. If you loan an SWHP pony we will also be writing to you separately.

Meanwhile, we know the horses are your primary concern and we will give you more details on the lovely resident horses in the next newsletter... and some of the staff too if they are not too shy!



Did you know?

Since 2002 Redwings has rescued over 500 horses and ponies from sites across Wales.

Our Head of Welfare and Behaviour Nic de Brauwere is currently the Chairman for the Animal Welfare Network Wales, a membership organisation which represents animals in Wales with the Welsh Government and carries out initiatives across the country to improve animal welfare. Nic and Redwings were also instrumental in the development of the recent Control of Horses (Wales) Act 2014.

Meet Ginger



Ginger was nominated by the SWHP staff as the first for us to meet in print as she's one of their absolute favourites (don't tell the others!).

Ann the SWHP Yard Manager said: "Ginger was originally

reported to us by a member of the public. She was in a small mud paddock in Ebbw Vale with no food and in chronic pain. On examination she had horrendously overgrown feet and was

crippled with laminitis. She was immediately signed over into our care but her rehabilitation has been one of the longest to date out of all our horses and ponies, as she needs specialist shoeing. The reason Ginger is so special to us all is that even though she was crippled with pain and extremely worried, she is the sweetest, kindest horse we have ever come across. Despite the number of times she's had to be visited by our farrier she will still lift up her own feet for him."





All our visitor centres are open every Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday 10am to 4pm (closed Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays)

Mylo has proved a major asset for both our educational work for children and our veterinary seminars for adults, and we look forward to even more people meeting him this year.



Sad loss of two cherished retired Adoption Stars

We were terribly sad to announce the passing of two beloved retired Adoption Stars, who both spent much of their lives greeting supporters at our Caldecott Visitor Centre.

Denise arrived at Redwings in 1996 when she was just a few days old. Her mum had developed mastitis (an inflammation of the mammary gland), which meant she could not produce milk for Denise. After arriving at Redwings, Denise was given roundthe-clock care by our team who bottle-fed her morning noon and night and she grew up into a happy and healthy donkey who was loved by all. Denise moved to Redwings Caldecott in 2001 where she spent 17 years as an Adoption Star before retiring from the scheme in September 2018, shortly after her 22nd birthday.

Denise had recently been diagnosed with Cushing's disease, a common condition affecting the pituitary gland in older equines, and had been receiving special veterinary attention for her teeth. Despite the treatment and lots of TLC, she begun to struggle to maintain her weight. Sadly her condition took a downturn and our vets felt they had no choice but to make the heart-breaking decision to



Icky arrived at Redwings in 1991 after he'd been found abandoned and was destined for slaughter. His real name was Haw Idris, a special name given to him when he was born and registered with the Spotted Pony Society. Icky later moved to Redwings Caldecott when it opened in 1999, and had lived there ever since before moving to our Horse Hospital at Hapton at the beginning of 2018 where our vets could keep a close eye on him.

Icky had sadly started to suffer with recurring bouts of colic, which was believed to be linked to issues with his intestines that meant he was unable to absorb glucose and nutrients. Unfortunately, when his condition deteriorated, our vets had to make the devastating decision to put him to sleep and he passed away on Friday 27th July at the Horse Hospital, shortly after his 30th birthday.

As two of our longest-serving Adoption Stars, we know both Icky and Denise will be sorely missed by their supporters and carers alike.

years old. Though he suffered with a few age-related problems, Victor had been in relatively good health for his age, and enjoyed life playing with his younger Shetland friends, including Adoption Star Davzee.

Unfortunately, Victor had begun to suffer from blockages in his oesophagus, which was potentially caused by an abnormal growth and meant he was



struggling to get all the nutrients he needed and maintain his weight.

We know that Victor will be sadly missed by his carers and visitors alike.

A fond farewell to Dylan and Major



We're terribly sorry to bring you some doubly-sad news in this edition. At the start of 2019, we said a heart-wrenching goodbye to retired Adoption Stars Major and Dylan.

Towering at 17.3hh, it wasn't difficult to spot mighty Major at Redwings Oxhill! This stunning Percheron cross came to Redwings in 2012 when the rare breeds country park where he lived was forced to close. Despite his size, Major was a real gentle giant and would even lower his head so his supporters could tickle behind his ears.

Major retired from our Adoption Scheme in 2017 due to chronic lameness and worsening ataxia (wobbliness on his feet). Unfortunately recent tests showed his condition had deteriorated and he had also begun to suffer from degenerative joint disease. Despite the best efforts of our vets and farriers to keep him comfortable, the heartbreaking decision was made to put him to sleep and he sadly passed away on 22nd January.

Just two weeks previously, we lost Welsh cross pony Dylan, who had lived at Redwings Oxhill since it opened in 2004! As a youngster, poor Dylan was found painfully thin, wandering the Welsh commons. He was born with a condition called 'locking stifles' which made it very difficult for him to move about and find food. At the Sanctuary, he received all the specialist care he needed and was a popular Adoption Star for 14 years before his retirement in January 2018. Sadly, in later life, he began to experience persistent and worsening lameness, so the kind decision was made to put him to sleep so he would not suffer.

We are all devastated at their loss and will never forget these wonderful Adoption Stars who gave so much joy to so many supporters for so many years.






Marmite makes a special appearance at Your Horse Live!
